How to Access

Curriculum packages are available free of charge to help service organizations present workshops. Each package includes instructor's guide, PowerPoint slides and handouts for a one-day workshop (approx. 6.5 hours). You are free to adapt all materials to meet your needs. We only ask that credit be given to StEPs/AASLH and information about StEPs be presented at the beginning of each workshop. Funding for the curricula series provided by IMLS.

For the past several years, AASLH has encouraged formation of state-based StEPs communities of practice. This initiative is based on evaluative data and feedback collected when AASLH piloted StEPs seven years ago. A number of the 47 test sites reported that interaction with other museums and sites and with a state or regional museum association or other service organization greatly enhanced their experience and progress.

As with many other support group models, realizing that other museums and sites share the same challenges and concerns as your organization is not only validating but empowering. Often, staff and volunteers at small history organizations feel isolated especially if they are the only museum or site in their community. Joining a StEPs community of practice can make a huge difference because it offers networking, shared learning, and an accountability mechanism that promotes progress.

Here's what is going on in states where a StEPs group has formed or efforts are being made to start one:

 The longest running and most structured is sponsored by Connecticut Humanities and the Connecticut League of History Organizations. StEPs-CT offers professional development, facilitated conversation, and mentorship opportunities. Organizations that complete the twoyear program receive exclusive access to competitive grant funds. The program served twentyfour organizations from 2012-14. Those organizations earned a total of 116 Bronze, Silver or Gold certificates (40% of all StEPs certificates awarded nationwide!) and, upon completion of the two-year program, received over \$45,000 in grants. In 2015, twenty-three new organizations embarked on their StEPs-CT journey and Connecticut Historical Society now helps as a partner organization. - The King County, Washington-based organization, 4Culture, has created StEPs 4Culture that combines professional development, training, mentorship, peer support, and incentive-based funding all structured around StEPs. Fifty organizations in the Seattle area have taken part in convenings, roundtables, mentor opportunities, and other activities. Contact Brian Carter.
- In Tennessee, AASLH received funding from the Community Foundation of Middle Tennessee to work with five history organizations beginning in 2012. Grant funding was renewed twice. Although the project officially ended in late 2015, the group continues to network and meet quarterly. Contact Bethany Hawkins for more information.
- StEPs for Ohio is an initiative of Ohio History Connection. The OHC Local History Office is
 working with AmericCorps workers to offer workshops, webinars, and one-on-one consulting.
 The goal for StEPs for Ohio is to help participating local history organizations gain solid footing
 in the program by earning the six Bronze certificates within a two-year time period. For more

- In Carmel, Indiana, Hamilton County's Education Leadership Program for Heritage Organizations
 (HELP) is using StEPs to improve sustainability of local heritage organizations. The initiative is
 sponsored and funded by Hamilton County Tourism. The Indiana Historical Society is assisting
 with the program. Nine heritage organizations are taking part in workshops and consultations
 over a three-year period. Contact Allan Rowe for more information.
- In the past two years, Humanities Nebraska has provided funding for more than ten history
 organizations to enroll in StEPs. The organizations will meet at the 2016 Nebraska Museums
 Association meeting. Also, the North Carolina Humanities Council has funded StEPs enrollment
 for organizations that have participated in the MoMS traveling exhibits program.
- Utah Humanities History and Museums Program Office Megan van Frank working with Jennifer
 Ortiz, Museum Specialist with the Utah Division of Arts and Museums, use StEPs materials in
 conjunction with the Utah Performance Goals Program.
- Beginning with its 2016 grant cycle, the New Jersey Historical Commission now requires that
 grant applicants be involved in an assessment program like StEPs. The Commission is also using
 StEPs to help it identify history organizations' most pressing needs across the state.
- Chester County Historical Society, Westchester, PA, in partnership with the Conservation Center for Art & Historic Artifacts is guiding a small group of local history organizations through StEPs.
 The Alabama Department of Archives and History is also working with a small group on StEPs.
