Historic House Museums: How to Stay Current and Relevant in a Changing World

The AASLH Historic House Museum (HHM) Affinity Group Committee is working to address the multitude of changes occurring in our field. You can read about some of our efforts here: <u>http://www.aaslh.org/hhouses.htm</u>.

In my three plus years as chair of the AASLH Historic House committee, I have witnessed our group of bright and dedicated HHM professionals continuously search for ways to help HHMs remain sustainable. It is now apparent that each house is unique and that it will take an individualized approach to find what works.

First and foremost is to find out what your community as you define it *needs* from your HHM. There are a number of ways to approach the question both formally and informally. Here are a few suggestions:

- Keep your ear to the ground. Find out what most concerns your community.
- Be an active community member. Attend meetings, read newsletters, talk with people in the know.
- Get to know your local business and political leaders. Tell them about your HHM and all that you do. Ask them what more you could offer that might address community issues.
- Conduct a community "Needs Assessment." This can be as simple as an informal phone call to several different organizations in your community to a formal survey conducted and analyzed by specialized consultants. Check in with community social service agencies, local government officials, religious entities, schools, parents groups, etc. to ask what they would like to see your HHM do to make the community a better place to live.

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Connecting to Collections Online Community

Are you a part of the <u>Connecting to Collections</u> <u>online community</u>? If not, you should join now.

This free online resource managed by Heritage Preservation and funded by IMLS offers great specific information on caring for your collections. AASLH is proud to be a partner in this important project.

- Ask how your particular assets might be better utilized, whether it be meeting space, outdoor areas, a barn, garden space, or indoor room for classes and other activities.
- Become a resource that is too important for your community to let you fail!

Then, do your homework. Research, read, and listen to other museum professionals to find out what others are trying. Many ideas can be adapted from other types of museum to HHMs. Your membership in AASLH, AAM (the American Association of Museums), and other professional organizations are invaluable sources of information.

There is an impressive array of blog postings available for free, written by some of the smartest and most creative people in our field. Blogs are web logs or diaries written on a continuing basis. Think of them as virtual communities, especially if there is an active comment section. Try these and search for others by following links or accessing bibliographies.


