

## **Exhibitions in Historic Houses?**. Part III

The <u>previous article</u> in this series addressed curatorial and installation issues around interpretive exhibits in historic house museums. This final article examines conservation and security considerations.

Object conservation and security often present some of the most puzzling challenges when creating an exhibit in a historic structure. With minimal staffing, and buildings without sophisticated



Stringent conservation standards for gallery temperature and humidity often cannot be achieved with an older building with often antiquated heating and cooling systems. However, the goal in this situation should be to keep the temperature and humidity in the gallery as consistent as possible, because it is drastic changes in temperature and humidity that pose the greatest threat to objects.

Providing appropriate gallery security with minimal staffing presents another challenge. Exhibit planners must balance the needs of visitors to move freely through an exhibit at their own pace, while making sure objects are not easily damaged or stolen. Often, the simple presence of a docent or guide in the exhibit space is sufficient to prevent theft or damage. Exhibits can be restricted to objects that are more robust and cannot easily be broken or taken out of the gallery, or reproductions can be judiciously used in place of particularly valuable or fragile objects.

While there are many challenges to using a historic house as an exhibit space, the rewards can be great: attracting new visitors, bring back old ones, and engaging volunteers, board members, and community leaders. Every building and organization is different, so the best way to begin creating small exhibits is to try it, and build expertise through experience.
