CAAREE's Goals

- Empower, enrich, and educate young children about identity, race, and African American history in developmentally appropriate ways.
- Support and expand the understanding adults have about this unique age by demonstrating how to talk about identity, race, and African American history with young children.
- Promote equity, tolerance, and justice in childhood when attitudes are only just beginning to formulate and develop.
 Challenge traditions and attitudes that serve to perpetuate discrimination and prejudice through age appropriate interventions.
- Contribute to the scholarly understanding of this age in regards to race and identity and the power museums have to expand young children's understanding of their world.

Pilot Programs

Developmentally appropriate experiences are object-based and engage children's senses and imaginations while challenging their critical thinking skills Research shows that talking about identity, especially race and gender, with young children is fundamental to reducing prejudice thinking and to promote equity, tolerance, and justice.

Because children are not colorblind, exploring and promoting positive identity will be a significant component of our early childhood programming.
